


# Things I need to know about GP practices

# Things I need to know about GP practices



A GP practice is a place where you can see a GP doctor, nurse or other people, to talk about your health. GP practices are often the first place a person visits when they need help with a health problem.

Anyone can see a GP doctor for free, in the UK. If you are not signed up (registered) with a GP practice, you can get free emergency treatment at any GP practice.

# Find and register with a GP practice



To **find** a **local GP** practice, you can **type 'Find a GP'** on **Google** to go on the NHS website. **Then**, **type** your **postcode** in the search box.





You can **sign up** (register) **online** on the NHS 'Find a GP' website **or go to the GP practice to fill in a form**.



You **don't need proof** of **address** to register **but it is helpful to have some ID** with you. For example, a passport, birth certificate, HC2 certificate or a rough sleepers ID badge.



## Problems registering with a GP practice



The GP practice will help you with any problems registering. Sometimes, GP practices are not taking new patients or can only register patients living in the area.



If you can not register with a GP practice, you can call the NHS England customer service number on 0300 311 2233.

## Booking and going to a GP practice appointment



To **book** an **appointment**, you can **call** or **go to the GP** practice.



You can also book an appointment online on the GP practice website.



When you book your appointment the GP practice will ask you some questions to find out how quickly you need to be seen and who is the best person to see you.



# Where will my appointment be?





Your **appointment** can be **over** the **phone**, **in person** or **online**.



Please tell your GP practice if an online appointment is difficult for you. Your GP practice can make a fair change (reasonable adjustment) and change your appointment to see you in person or over the phone.

## Fair changes GP practices can make to help you



GP practices can make fair changes (reasonable adjustments) to help you attend appointments and make you feel comfortable.



For example, your **GP practice** can **give you** an **Easy Read** document (like this one) with **important information** about your health.



GP practices can organise a translator when English is not your first language. A translator will talk with you in your language and tell the GP what you said in English.



### Fair changes GP practices can make to help you



GP practices can also **organise** a **chaperone** to be with you at the appointment. A **chaperone is** a **person** that **can be** in the **room with you** to **help** you **feel safe**.



You can also **choose someone you trust**, like **a friend** or **family** member, to **help you with** your **appointments**. For example, to **book appointments** or **get medications** for you.

#### Make sure you need a GP practice appointment



You can **treat** yourself **at home** when you have **minor sprains, coughs** or a **cold**.



You can also treat yourself at home, when you have **small cuts, grazes** or **bruises.** 



A **pharmacy** can **help** you with things like **headaches** or **stomach upsets.** 



A pharmacy can also help you with insect bites or stings.



## Signs you need to see a GP



See a GP doctor when it is taking a long time to get better (persistent symptoms).



You should also **see** a **doctor** when you **have** a **pain** that **doesn't go away** (chronic pain).



You have a **strange/unusual lump** or **bump**.



You have a **health problem** that **needs regular care** (long-term condition). For example, people need regular care for asthma.

## Signs you need go to A&E at the hospital



You have **chest pain** or **difficulty breathing**.





You **lost a lot** of **blood or** the **bleeding** is **not stopping.** 





You had a **serious injury** or a **sudden** and **severe pain**.
